## **SECOND VELYCHKOVSKY PILGRIMAGE**

### **IN THE FOOTSTEPS OF A MARTYR**

This past summer 18 pilgrims from across Canada traveled to Ukraine to follow in the footsteps of Blessed Vasyl. This was a prayerful journey, seeking to come to know Blessed Vasyl in a deeper way and to offer our prayers and sufferings for our needs and the needs of the Church.

We visited the city of Stanislaviv (now Ivanno-Frankivsk) where he was born (1903); the church where he was baptized and where he received the seal of the Holy Spirit. We visited the parish church in the village of Shuparka, where he grew up as a young boy and received his first Holy Communion from the hands of his father, Fr. Volodymyr. It was also the place of his first Solemn Divine Liturgy. Here we prayed (with some local parishioners) the Acatist Hymn to our Martyr. We visited the province of Volyn and in particular the city of Kovel, where he was an untiring missionary among the Orthodox and Ukrainian Catholic faithful from 1928-35. A new church has been built in this city in honor of Blessed Bishop and Martyr Nicholas Charnetsky & Blessed Vasyl. While in Ivanno-Frankivsk, we visited the site of the former Redemptorist monastery, where Blessed

Vasyl was the Superior from 1935-41. His plans to build a church here were cut short by World War II. Now, a new church is being completed on this site and will be blessed in September in his honor. This was also the site of his first arrest at the end of June 1940. He was released several days later when the NKVD witnessed the protests of young women and parishioners. We went to the fortress city of Kamianetz-Podilsk, where Blessed Vasyl was sent to re-establish the Ukrainian Catholic Church in 1942. He had great success, although it was short-lived.

In Ternopil, we celebrated the Divine Liturgy in the rebuilt Redemptorist church. The original church was demolished by the Soviets in 1963. Here Blessed Vasyl was the Superior during WW II and where he was arrested on July 26<sup>th</sup>

In Kyiv we prayed "clandestinely" before the former KGB prison, where Blessed Vasyl was on death row in 1946. This building is still the headquarters of Ukraine's Secret Service or police force (the SBU). Unfortunately, we were unable to go to Vorkuta, to northern Russia, to see the laager camp where he was imprisoned until 1955.

We had the privilege of celebrating the Divine Liturgy on the same altar that Blessed Vasyl celebrated everyday in his apartment in Lviv. He lived in this apartment from 1955 until his arrest in 1969. From this apartment, he organized the activity of the underground church. It became a spiritual centre to which many Catholics came seeking the mercy of confession or advice. From here he was arrested again on January 27, 1969. This apartment has now been restored to its original state and is a museum and shrine.

We prayed before the prison in Lviv where he was kept for 9 months. In this prison, he was pronounced dead and was being taken to the morgue when it was discovered that Blessed Vasyl was alive. We prayed before the court house where he was sentenced on criminal charges for the book he wrote on our Mother of Perpetual Help. Unfortunately, we could not travel to the prison in Komunarsk in Eastern Ukraine where he was tortured physically, chemically and with electrical currents.

We walked and prayed in the footsteps of Blessed Martyr Bishop Vasyl. This journey gave us a deeper sense of his presence and a closeness to him as we breathed the air he breathed and experienced the

1945. It was here that he made known to the NKVD that he would not deny Christ or the Catholic Church. He suffered the consequences and now wears the martyr's crown.

places he experienced. His presence was also felt as we visited the sites of other fellow martyrs: Bishop Nicholas Charnetsky, C.Ss.R. in St Josaphat's Redemptorist Church; Blessed Zenon Kowalyk C.Ss.R., the prison where he was crucified; Blessed Sister Olympia SJS and Sister Lawrentia SJS at the motherhouse of the St. Joseph Sisters, which are all located in Lviv; and Blessed Father Nicholas Konrad & Cantor Volodymyr Preyima in Stratch. We visited and prayed at the gravesites of his parents. Our pilgrimage joined several hundreds of thousands of pilgrims for the "All-Ukraine Pilgrimage" in Zarvanytsia, where there is a beautiful Shrine to our Mother of God. There, we took part in the services of the all-night vigil, the candlelight procession, the hymns, the Pontifical Divine Liturgy with Patriarch Lubomyr and the veneration of the icon of our Lady of Zarvanytsia. Our pilgrims had the opportunity to receive Holy Water which flows abundantly at this site.

The whole pilgrimage was a spiritually uplifting experience, a time of prayer and a time of penance. We thank Blessed Vasyl for guiding us through his homeland and inspiring us in so many ways.

## My Pilgrimage to Ukraine

On July 4th 2010, several people gathered in the Shrine of Blessed Velychkovsky, Winnipeg, to ask for God's blessings on our pilgrimage and to help us follow in the footsteps of Blessed Vasyl and other martyrs in Ukraine.

Arriving in Lviv, we were bussed to Holosko, the Redemptorist monastery and seminary where Blessed Vasyl and many of our Redemptorist fathers studied. Immediately, I had a feeling of "This is Holy Ground " and I had a sense of deep respect which carried on throughout the whole pilgrimage.

We visited seminaries, and churches with gold plated domes. The interiors were breathtaking in the designed iconostasis, with frescos and icons of Jesus, the Blessed Mother, the apostles and many saints. There were times I was mesmerized by the splendor of a saint reaching out to me in radiance, causing me to lose the awareness of time and space. There were also feelings of sadness while visiting the prison in Kyiv, where Blessed Vasyl was on death row. I was depressed in Nadsirna at the U.P.A. museum, which was a prison and torture chamber for those who would not give up their faith. Seeing the names of people, who left messages to their loved ones, scraped on the cement walls. I can not deny the eerie feeling of their sufferings, interrogations and tortures by the enemies of the church. Yet, at the same time, there was an awareness of the power of God in these holy people, who had the spiritual strength of the cement walls that held them prisoner.

There were several times during the pilgrimage, where I was aware of the presence of God. The celebrations at Zarvanytsia are comparable to the Shrines in Lourdes and Fatima. The shrine at Zarvanytsia is known for its miracle working icon of the Mother Of God. After Liturgy, Panahyda and Blessing of Water, there was a candle light procession at midnight. I felt truly blessed to be able to stand on the balcony of our hotel and watch an estimated 800.000 people coming towards the church. The faces could not be seen, but each candle was a bright light in the darkness of

our sad world. Each candle represented the Holy Spirit of the person carrying it. In my mind's eye, I imagined all these thousands of little lights joining together, forming one great flame, and expressing our love for God as did Blessed Vasyl. He did not suffer and die in vain. Let us continue to pray that the enemies of the church be converted to God.

May the Blessed Mother who loves the Ukrainian people take all of us under the protection of her mantle and bring closer the bond between God and people.

I came home tired but my experience of the pilgrimage was awesome. It certainly deepened my spiritual life. With sincere appreciation and heartfelt gratitude, I thank Blessed Vasyl for all his sufferings. Through him, I had a journey of a life time rich in prayer and gained greater hope for our world.

Since it fell on a Sunday, more people benefited from the graces that flowed from this sacred day. We began with Saturday evening Vespers in honor of the martyrs. After the evening Liturgy there was a small reception in the Church auditorium, followed by the play "Fragments of a Martyr's Life" performed by the youth. This theatre group has been performing the play since 2007 and did a superb and mature production.

On Sunday, the Divine Liturgy was filled with people from Winnipeg and beyond. Each pilgrim was blessed at the end of the Liturgy with the sacred oil of Blessed Vasyl. Some pilgrims come yearly from rural Manitoba, Saskatchewan and the United States. After the Liturgy, we

heard wonderful testimonies from Evhenia & Vasily Fedorko-Bartos of Calgary. Everyone was moved by their witness. The following is their story:

Evhenia Fedorko comes from a priestly family in Ukraine. She was very active during the underground church in Ukraine and had to escape arrest in 1987 by fleeing the country. She ended up in Canada. In 1993, she married Vasily, who had fought in the Bosnian war. He suffered from the effects of the war with post-traumatic war syndrome. Two years ago, while praying, Evhenia received a spiritual gift. Holy oil began appearing on her body, especially the face and hands. After consultation with the parish priest, she began visiting the sick, praying with them and anointing them with this holy oil. Many were healed. The demand increased, so Evhenia prayed before the statute of Our Lady of Grace in her home and asked the Mother of God to intercede, because her face was not producing enough oil. On the feast of the Immaculate Conception, the statute began to weep with holy fragrant oil. This phenomenon continued, especially on Fridays and on feast days. The Bishop was informed and the due process began

with informing the Vatican. One of Evhenia's fervent prayers was for the healing of her husband, especially for him to become more religious. In the summer of 2009, Evhenia visited the Blessed Velychkovsky Martyr's Shrine in Winnipeg and brought back some holy cards and third class relics.

Her husband Vasily, had a dream several months earlier. In that dream, he was at a shrine and a saintly Bishop came to him and told him that he would be healed. After that dream, he secretly began to say the rosary. He was "driven" to say it.

When his wife brought back the holy cards from the Shrine, he recognized the face of that Bishop in his dream as Blessed Vasyl. When he discovered that the Bishop had the same name as him, his fervor increased. He began now to pray openly together with his wife and children before the oil-weeping statute of the Mother of God. His prayers were often

and noticed that it too was weeping oil. After calling the Shrine office, a small icon of Blessed Vasyl was sent to him. In November, the icon itself began weeping holy fragrant oil. At the end of November, Vasily gave this fragrant icon to be kept in the Shrine in Winnipeg. It is there today. Much of Vasily's illness has been healed, although at times he still struggles with it.

Vasily and Evhenia brought the statute of our Lady of Grace with them for the feast day to Winnipeg.

While in St. Joseph's Church, it began to weep holy oil. Its fragrance filled the church. The faithful were able to go and pray before it and be blessed with this holy oil. They received much grace. Evhenia shared some stories about this statute. Two of these stories are as follows:

One time a Jewish man came with others to pray before this statute. Actually, he wanted to see if it was real. As the others were praying, they noticed that all of a sudden the statute dried up. The oil stopped flowing. Then it began to flow again from different areas of the statute and that each area had its own unique fragrance. Upon questioning him, he confessed that he was testing God and that he had asked for these phenomenon to happen. He was baptized a Catholic this past Easter.

In early May, a family (grandmother, mother and children) came to pray before the statute in Vasily's and Evhenia's home. The youngest child was just over a year old and was still being breast-fed. At one point, this child insisted on being fed. The statute of Our Lady of Grace was on the coffee-table before her. All of a sudden, the child turned to the statute and began a 15 minute "conversation" with the statute, with the Mother of God. The child giggled as if someone was playing with it and spoke baby babble, while focusing upon the statute of Our Lady at all times. Those in the room, were in awe.

The feast day was a great blessing for all the pilgrims who attended. The day concluded in the afternoon with an Acatist Service to Blessed Vasyil and a living rosary. An anointing with Blessed Vasyil holy oil followed.

*I told her about the prayers I had left at the shrine, and the intercession of Blessed Vasyl. She smiled back (she is not a Catholic, nor even a Christian, but a good person and quite used to our Catholic ways) and said: whatever works. I am grateful.*
