Bishop Velychkovsky National Martyr's Shrine

BEING TRUE & FAITHFUL

Being Tested by Life

Blessed Vasyl Velychkovsky lived mostly in the time of totalitarian regimes. He was born in Ukraine under the Austro-Hungarian Empire. This freedom, quickly came to an end when Blessed Vasyl found himself in World War I and the subsequent Polish-Ukrainian conflict. It is during this time that he joined the Ukrainian Riflemen to fight for the freedom of Ukraine

against Polish aggression. Eastern and Central Ukraine at the same time fell to the Soviet Union. Under Polish rule, the Polish language and culture were forced upon the Ukrainians. Blessed Vasyl at that time studied theology at the Ukrainian Lviv seminary,

one of the few schools of higher learning that was allowed to be in the Ukrainian language. He experienced this cultural and nationalistic persecution especially when he did pastoral and missionary work in Volyn. For this, he was chased out of Volyn and had to return to Halychyna (Western Ukraine), where he continued his mis-

sionary work.

Blessed Vasyl as a young Ukrainian Rifleman (Sichovy Striltsi)

As a young man, Blessed Vasyl made a choice while sitting in a Polish prison after he was captured as a Ukrainian Rifleman. He came to realize that the best way he could serve his beloved country was to become a soldier for Christ. Speaking in the third person he writes: "Many a young man, who was unwillingly enlisted

into the aggressor's army, underwent a hard school of life. Those who volunteered for the Ukrainian army, hoping that they could bring their motherland liberation from the chains of slavery, underwent a similar school. The Holy Spirit can direct these noble aspirations, dedications and devotions to a higher vocation. That is what happened to a young man who, while fighting for his motherland in 1918, heard an inner voice from God who said to him, 'Work and suffer for your motherland, as a good soldier for Christ." (pg. 130 A History of the Miraculous Icon of our Mother of Perpetual Help) It is this commitment to work and suffer for Christ that caused Blessed Vasyl to become a faithful priest until the end of his life, despite the harsh and terrible fate that awaited him.

Once World War II broke out in 1939, the Soviets in 1939, the Nazis in 1941 and then again

the Soviets in 1944 occupied Western Ukraine, Blessed Vasyl's resolve began to be tested. In 1940, he was detained by the NKVD (Soviet secret police force) for a

great procession through the city of Stanislaviv (now Ivano Frankivsk) in honour of our Mother of Perpetual Help. It was his intimacy with the Blessed Mother and our Lord that helped him endure the abuse

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and torture he received at the hands of the NKVD. He kept his eyes and mind fixed on this relationship ready to receive whatever abuse came his way. In 1941, he narrowly escaped death from the Nazis in Kamianetz Podilskiy, where he was doing pastoral and missionary work. He never waivered in serving the Lord, no matter what the circumstances. In August 1945,

when faced with arrest by the Soviets for being a priest of the Ukrainian Catholic Church, instead of trying to escape from their hands, after praying to the Mother of God, he freely approached the NKVD and succumbed to their arrest. His relationship with the Mother of God and with her Son Jesus gave him clarity of vision and

courage to seek the greater prize - *life forever in their presence*. He did not compromise his faith in the face of persecution or its consequences - *arrest and possible death*.

While in prison, he continued to secretly celebrate the Divine Mysteries, comfort his fellow-prisoners, offer them the Mystery of Confession and be a beacon of hope for them. Boris Mirus, a fellow prisoner said, "I do not know how we would have survived if it wasn't for the example and words of Father Vasyl Velychkovsky." The fear of his leadership among the prisoners caused the Soviet guards to punish him and throw him into solitary confinement especially during the Soviet commemorative days. Blessed Vasyl did not waiver in his commitment.

When he returned from prison and saw the dev-

astation of the Ukrainian Catholic Church, its illegalization, the closure and desecration of the churches, he did not shy away nor compromise with the authorities. He

began to lead the people and encourage them to practice their faith secretly. He did this even though he knew that it would infuriate the authorities and lead to a second arrest. He became known as the Father of the Underground Church. What gave Blessed Vasyl such courage and steadfastness in his faith? It was first his intimate and daily relationship with the Lord and the Mother of God. He was constantly seen praying the rosary. His focus was on this all important relationship and all else faded into the background. The totalitarian regimes with all its persecutions could not cause him to falter nor compromise his faith and convictions.

In today's world in North America, where we value freedom, we do not live in a totalitarian regime and we perhaps do not have such clear actions of persecution and arrest for our beliefs. However, our battle is much more subtle. Slowly laws are being passed by our governments that cause us to compromise our faith values. Under the guise of freedom and free

choice, our religious principles of the dignity of each human being from conception to natural death are being eroded. **During Blessed** Vasyl's time he was forbidden to wear any religious symbols or vestments. We are seeing the same spirit enter into our laws freely. Through the help of the news media, our minds are slowly being changed and being duped by

these false and ant-Christian values. Like Blessed Vasyl, we need to have that intimate relationship with our Lord and the Blessed Mother so that our minds always see clearly and that we unwilling do not compromise our convictions and faith values. May Blessed Vasyl help us to stand firm, to have a clear vision and a clear mind, always "keeping our eyes fixed on Jesus." (Hebrews 12:2)
