Bishop Velychkovsky National Martyr's Shrine

A life Centered on God's will

On July 9, 1955, Father Vasyl Velychkovsky was released from prison after spending ten years in the Soviet coal mines of the Vorkuta region in northern Russia. He came home to Lviv, Ukraine, to find that the people were in hiding, afraid to practice their Catholic faith for fear of being arrested. Father Vasyl was able to practice his Catholic faith secretly in prison with fellow prisoners; why could he not do this with the faithful who were abandoned?


With an open heart and trust in God's will, Father Vasyl started organizing the faithful secretly, celebrating Divine Liturgies, hearing confessions, and preaching the word of God in homes, forests, gravesides, or anywhere that appeared to be safe. Father Vasyl encouraged other priests to do the same carefully, forming the Underground Church.

In 1959, Rome appointed Father Vasyl as a bishop of the underground church. However, there was no bishop in Ukraine to ordain him.


In a dramatic turn of events in 1963, Metropolitan Josyf Slipyj, the head of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church, was released from an 18-year imprisonment in

Siberia. His release was specifically to allow him to attend the Second Vatican Council in Rome. While in Moscow, he was granted a rare opportunity to meet with one family member. He seized this chance to send telegrams to several of the priests in Ukraine, including one to Blessed Vasyl Velychkovsky. He wrote:

"I ask Father Vasyl Velychkovsky to come immediately [to Moscow]. I need his help. Tell him not to take anything with him so that he can take my unnecessary baggage."



Without any hesitation, Father Vasyl boarded the train to Moscow, not knowing what the outcome would be. He was the only priest that responded.

On February 4, 1963, in a Moscow hotel room, Metropolitan Slipyj secretly consecrated Father Vasyl to the episcopacy with a simple ceremony, without any of the majesty and pageantry that would have normally accompanied such an event.

This was a historical event for the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church. It was a thread that would keep the church connected, alive and vibrant to this very day. The consecration remained a secret for a long time.

The only memento from this event was a simple wooden hand carved walking stick given to Father Vasyl by Metropolitan Josyf. Metropolitan Josyf passed this stick on to Father Vasyl as a symbol of his episcopal authority. This walking stick substituted for the episcopal crozier. Father Vasyl was the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Archbishop who lead the underground Church in Ukraine.

Father Vasyl's Episcopal consecration was kept a secret and only a chosen few knew about it.

As soon as he returned to Lviv, his small apartment became his episcopal cathedral and chancery. Bishop Vasyl was able to



organize secret seminaries in Lviv and Ternopil. The seminarians were educated by other priests and were ordained in ordinary homes.

Bishop Vasyl ordained new priests to the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church despite the fact that the Catholic Churches and Monasteries were confiscated by the state. It was very dangerous to practice ones Catholic faith.



He worked very hard to re-establish the Redemptorist Congregation as well as the Sisters of Saint Basil and the Studite Sisters.

To ensure that the Underground Church was not left without a bishop, Bishop Vasyl consecrated a fellow Redemptorist priest, Father Volodymyr Sterniuk, to the episcopacy on July 2, 1964.

Bishop Volodymyr's identity was kept secret and he was not to function as a bishop. He would only do so, if Bishop Vasyl was arrested or exiled. Bishop Volodymyr became the

head of the Underground Church in 1972, after Bishop Vasyl was exiled from Ukraine.

Bishop Vasyl never had the opportunity to publicly serve as a Bishop in his beloved Ukraine. However, his ministry in the underground church kept the Ukrainian Catholic faith alive.

The consecration of Bishop Volodymyr was perhaps the most important act of Bishop Vasyl's legacy. This historical event ensured that the underground church would survive this time of persecution.

Bishop Volodymyr led the Underground Church until 1991 when the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church again became legal. He brought the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church from the underground.

Blessed Vasyl was on fire with God's love, giving him the grace to accept and embrace all that was placed before him on his life journey. Are we willing to trust in God with an open heart for all of our daily encounters and decisions?

FAITH IN TIMES OF TRIAL

Over the past year and a half, prayers were said daily as we waited in hope for news and information about our Redemptorist priests, Father Bohdan Geleta and Father Ivan Levytsky. They were in Russian captivity since November 2022 after they were arrested in Berdyansk, a port city in Zaporizhzhia Oblast, Ukraine.

On June 28th the news was announced, that the Fathers were released from prison and returned to their homeland of Ukraine.



On Sunday, July 14, Fr. Bohdan Geleta and Fr. Ivan Levytsky concelebrated at the Hierarchical Divine Liturgy led by His Beatitude Sviatoslav in Zarvanytsia, Ükraine.

In an interview with Father Bohdan Geleta on the UGCC Zhyve Television, he expressed his gratitude to the Lord God and all those who contributed to their liberation. He also said: "Thank you to our faithful who prayed, whom we do not even know. The entire Church prayed." He expressed that while in captivity he personally sensed the feelings that the whole Church was praying,

BLESSED VASYL MINISTRY IN UKRAINE

Did you know?

The Blessed Bishop Vasyl Velychkovsky Martyr's Shrine funds and operates a satellite ministry in Ukraine. Throughout the years there have been photos and articles printed in the Newsletters about the blessed ministry that is happening in Ukraine.

There is the work that takes place at the Blessed Vasyl Velychkovsky museum, located in his original apartment in downtown Lviv. In addition and perhaps even more importantly, there is the ministry of making Blessed Vasyl known through presentations (over 6,000), prayer services and bringing of his holy relics for veneration to places throughout Ukraine and beyond.

For the past ten years, Oleh and Tanya Chykharivsky, have dedicated their weekends and evenings to bring Blessed Vasyl to the people. Their mission has taken them to parish communities throughout Ukraine and in Poland, France, Switzerland, Rome and Slovenia. Since they began this ministry, they have traveled over 300,000 kilometers.

Today, their ministry of outreach is needed more than ever. Despite the horrors of war, they continue to bring Blessed Vasyl to the faithful, including soldiers near the front. Through their mission and devotion to Blessed Bishop and Martyr Vasyl, they are inspiring deeper faith, hope and comfort to all those that they meet. Many soldiers have the 3rd Class Relic with them as they defend their country.

Something big is happening! I do not know how my family convinced me, but I gave in. I knew that I would be facing many challenges. There was a seventeen year gap since I last practiced my profession. The new technology would be very challenging and I am not very young. It will be tough for me to start all over again.

Sometime in September, 2023, I read about Blessed Bishop's life story and his perseverance in faith. I visited his Holy Relics to pay homage to him. From that time on my devotion to him began.

Reviewing for the board exams was not easy for me. I cried so many times. I turned to Blessed Vasyl's icon beside my study table whenever I got overwhelmed. I would kneel and ask for his blessings. Even when I was driving or doing household chores, I would

sing his hymn and pray the holy rosary every single day. Nobody knew how much I struggled.

Friday was my exam day. In between the tough questions,



I would say a "Hail Mary" and call upon Blessed Vasyl "Help me". I was the last to leave the exam room with tears of uncertainty and exhaustion.

Saturday morning, I got up with a sense of peace and calm. I claimed this as the gift of the Holy Spirit as I prayed for humility to accept whatever the result. There were no tears, no anxious feelings. The first words I spoke were "thank you" to my husband and son – who motivated me so much to persevere. I could not explain the sense of peace I had that day. I started fasting. Sunday I attended the Divine Liturgy and ended my fast Sunday afternoon. My son checked online for the quick unofficial results; Blessed Bishop Vasyl brought my prayers to the arms of God! I knelt down, and my family jumped for


